





How Nachman Libeskind Survived the Nazis, Gulags, and Soviet Communism

with author Annette Libeskind Berkovits

Three years after her father's death, Annette was going through his things and found a box of tapes - several years' worth - recounting his spectacular life, triumphs, and tragedies. Nachman Libeskind's remarkable story is an odyssey through crucial events of the twentieth century.

With an unshakable will and a few drops of luck, he survives a pre-war Polish prison; witnesses the 1939 Nazi invasion of Lodz and narrowly escapes; is imprisoned in a brutal Soviet gulag where he helps his fellow inmates survive, and upon regaining his freedom treks to the foothills of the Himalayas, where he finds and nearly loses the love of his life. His life story then takes him from postwar Poland, to Israel and finally New York.

Annette Libeskind Berkovits tells more than just her father's story. Join us as she shares a family saga and its turbulent past *in the unlikeliest of places*.





Annette Libeskind Berkovits was born in Kyrgyzstan and grew up in postwar Poland and the fledgling state of Israel before coming to America at age sixteen.

Now retired, she is pursuing her life-long love of writing. Her work has appeared in *Silk Road Review: a Literary Crossroads*; *Persimmon Tree* and in *American Gothic: a New Chamber Opera*.

Robert Milby, of Florida, NY has been reading his poems from the gutter to the garret in the Hudson Valley and beyond, over 1,000 times since March 1995. He has hosted 28 poetry readings series since late 1995. He currently hosts 4 Hudson Valley poetry series. His work has been published over 200 times throughout the Northeast since 1990, in over 2 dozen magazines and 17 anthologies.



The Great War and the Human Condition: Experiences of Soldiers during World War I

During the Great War of 1914-1918, 60 million men from all over the world fought on various fronts across the globe. By its end, 29 million of them would become casualties of this war. Some theaters of the war presented unique environments, creating terrible hardships. New types of warfare were developed – and led to the death of over 9 million combatants. This presentation will share the soldiers' war-time experiences; recruitment, training, in depth descriptions of

battle field experiences (both at the front and behind the lines), and their post-war experiences.

Many photographs of the Western Front as it existed during 1914-1918 will be included, as will images of some of those same locations today.





William Broggy

Bill Broggy is a history teacher at Fox Lane High School in Bedford, NY. He has been studying World War I for the past 12 years, having read scores of books on the topic. He has also toured the battlefields of the Western Front with historians, and is planning on writing a World War themed novel. A teacher of history for 33 years, Bill is currently teaching AP United States History, AP European History, and Philosophy.
